Chairman's Speech

Dear Shareholders, Members of the Board, and Esteemed Stakeholders,

It gives me great pleasure to present to you the performance of the Company for the financial year 2025–26.

Our Company remains firmly committed to its mission of standing with the farming community—the backbone of our nation. The progress of farmers continues to be at the heart of our business, and we remain focused on providing quality fertilisers and seeds while steadily building a diversified and sustainable business portfolio.

Performance During FY 2025–26

The financial year under review was marked by a challenging operating environment. Geopolitical uncertainties, volatility in international raw material prices—particularly sulphur—and fluctuations in foreign exchange rates created pressure across the industry. Despite these challenges, the Company remained focused on operational efficiency, cost optimisation, prudent inventory management and strengthening its market presence.

I am pleased to share that, against this challenging backdrop, the Company achieved a significant improvement in its overall performance.

The Company recorded a turnover of ₹587.34 crore, compared with ₹469.69 crore in the previous financial year. This represents a strong growth in our overall business and reflects the resilience of our operations, the confidence of our customers and the continued efforts of our employees and business partners.

The Fertiliser Division delivered its highest-ever turnover of ₹331.45 crore, compared with ₹269.24 crore in the previous year. This performance reflects sustained demand for our products and our continued focus on our core fertiliser business. The division remains a key pillar of the Company's operations, and we will continue to strengthen our market reach and customer relationships.

The Seed Division remained resilient, recording a turnover of ₹142.50 crore, compared with ₹146.90 crore in the previous year. In a competitive and evolving market, maintaining this level of performance demonstrates the strength of our seed portfolio and the continued trust placed in our products. We remain committed to strengthening our research-based seed offerings and expanding their acceptance among farmers.

I am particularly encouraged by the performance of our LABSA business, which continued its strong growth trajectory. Turnover from this division increased to ₹88.72 crore, compared with ₹38.97 crore in the previous year—more than a two-fold increase. This performance demonstrates the potential of our diversified businesses and reinforces our strategy of creating additional and sustainable sources of revenue.

Our other business activities, including Warehousing, Cold Storage and Pipes, also recorded a significant improvement. The aggregate turnover from these businesses increased from ₹14.58 crore to ₹24.68 crore. This progress reflects the Company's continued efforts to diversify its operations and build a broader and more resilient revenue base.

Fertiliser Business and Government Support

The fertiliser industry continued to operate in an environment of considerable uncertainty during the year. International prices of fertiliser inputs remained volatile, influenced by geopolitical developments, supply conditions and changes in input costs.

Government policy support, particularly through the Nutrient Based Subsidy, continued to play an important role in maintaining stability in the fertiliser sector. The NBS for phosphatic fertilisers was increased to ₹7,263 per MT for April–September 2025, compared with ₹5,121 per MT earlier, and was subsequently increased further to ₹7,408 per MT for October 2025–March 2026.

These measures provided meaningful support to fertiliser operations and helped partially offset the impact of higher raw material and production costs.

While profitability remained modest, the Company's ability to remain profitable in such a challenging environment is a reflection of the disciplined approach adopted by the management towards costs, inventory and operations.

Our Diversification Strategy

As we move forward, diversification will remain an important part of our strategy.

Our performance in LABSA, Warehousing, Cold Storage and Pipes demonstrates that the Company has the capability to build businesses beyond its traditional areas of operation. At the same time, we remain conscious that diversification must be pursued with discipline, appropriate capital allocation and a clear focus on sustainable returns.

Our objective is not diversification for its own sake, but to create a balanced business portfolio that can provide greater resilience across market cycles and contribute meaningfully to the Company's long-term growth.

Outlook for FY 2026–27

Looking ahead, we remain cautiously optimistic about the prospects for the financial year 2026–27.

The monsoon will continue to be one of the most important factors influencing agricultural activity, fertiliser consumption and demand across our key markets. While initial indicators suggest a broadly normal monsoon, some variability and a possible shortfall after July 2026 remain areas that require close monitoring.

Government support for the fertiliser industry also remains encouraging. The NBS for phosphatic fertilisers has been further increased to ₹8,149 per MT, compared with ₹7,408 per MT during the second half of FY 2025–26. Continued policy support, including indications regarding freight subsidy support for phosphatic fertilisers, is expected to provide greater stability to the sector.

However, we remain mindful of the risks. Geopolitical tensions and the continuing conflict in the Middle East could affect the availability and prices of critical raw materials, particularly sulphur. Foreign exchange volatility and any sustained increase in input costs may also continue to put pressure on margins.

In this environment, our approach will remain focused and disciplined. We will continue to pursue operational efficiency, cost optimisation, effective inventory management and prudent capital deployment. At the same time, we will continue to strengthen our market presence and leverage opportunities across our diversified business segments.

Commitment to Farmers and Stakeholders

Our relationship with the farming community remains central to our purpose. We believe that a strong agricultural economy requires not only availability of inputs but also quality, reliability and the trust of farmers.

We will therefore continue to work towards strengthening our product portfolio, expanding our reach and deepening our engagement with farmers and channel partners.

At the same time, we recognise that our responsibilities extend to all our stakeholders—shareholders, employees, customers, suppliers, business partners and the communities in which we operate. Sustainable growth can only be achieved when value is created responsibly and consistently for all stakeholders.

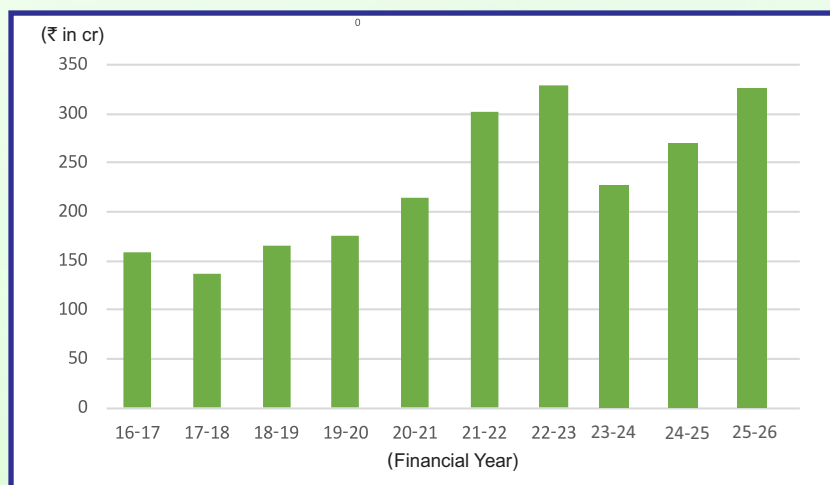

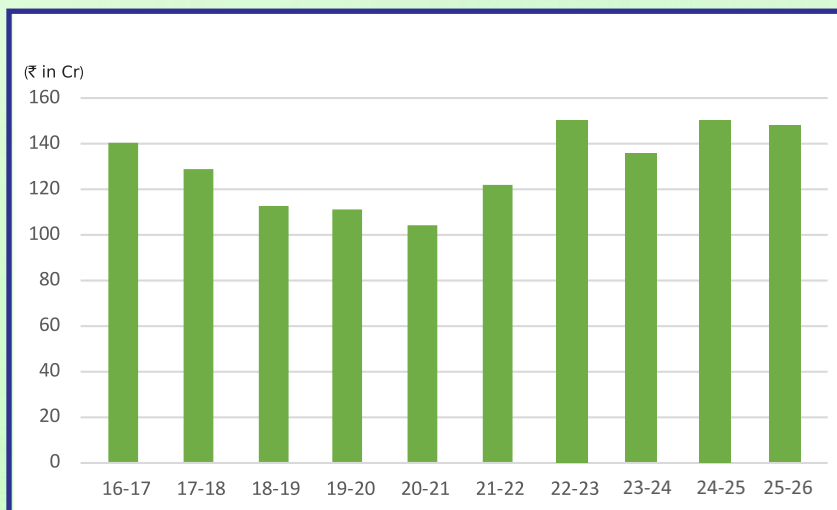

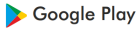

Your Directors have pleasure in presenting the 36th Annual Report of the Company together with the audited statements of account for the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

2. Performance of the Company

The financial year 2025–26 was a challenging year for the Company, marked by geopolitical uncertainties, volatility in raw material prices—particularly sulphur—and fluctuations in foreign exchange rates. Despite these external challenges, the Company remained focused on strengthening operational efficiency, optimizing costs, improving inventory management, and expanding its market presence.

Against this backdrop, the Company achieved a significant milestone by recording a turnover of ₹587.34 crore, as compared with ₹469.69 crore in the previous financial year.

The Fertiliser Division recorded its highest-ever turnover of ₹331.45 crore, compared with ₹269.24 crore in the previous year, reflecting sustained demand and continued focus on the Company's core business.

The Seed Division remained resilient and maintained its turnover at ₹142.50 crore, as compared with ₹146.90 crore in the previous year.

The Company's LABSA division continued its strong growth trajectory and contributed ₹88.72 crore to the overall turnover, compared with ₹38.97 crore in the previous year, representing more than a two-fold increase in turnover.

The Company's other business divisions, including Warehousing, Cold Storage and Pipes, also recorded a significant improvement in their contribution to the overall turnover. The aggregate turnover from these divisions increased from ₹14.58 crore to ₹24.68 crore, demonstrating the Company's continued efforts to diversify its business operations and strengthen its revenue base.

Fertiliser Business and Government Support

During the year under review, international fertiliser prices remained volatile, primarily due to geopolitical developments and fluctuations in input costs. In response to these developments, the Government of India increased the Nutrient Based Subsidy (NBS) for phosphatic fertilisers to ₹7,263 per MT for the period from April 2025 to September 2025, as against ₹5,121 per MT previously. Subsequently, the NBS rate was further increased to ₹7,408 per MT for the period from October 2025 to March 2026.

The increase in NBS provided support to the Company's fertiliser operations and helped partially offset the impact of higher production costs arising from increased raw material prices. Despite the challenging operating environment, the Company was able to maintain profitability, albeit at a modest level.

Outlook for FY 2026–27

The outlook for the financial year 2026–27 remains cautiously optimistic. Preliminary indicators point towards a broadly normal monsoon during the initial part of the season, although some variability and a possible shortfall are expected after July 2026. The monsoon remains a key factor influencing agricultural activity, fertiliser consumption and overall demand in the Company's key markets.

The Government of India has further increased the NBS rate for phosphatic fertilisers to ₹8,149 per MT, compared with ₹7,408 per MT applicable during the second half of FY 2025–26. The continued policy support for the fertiliser sector, including indications regarding freight subsidy support for phosphatic fertilisers, is expected to provide further stability to the industry.

At the same time, the continuing geopolitical tensions and the ongoing conflict in the Middle East remain areas of concern, particularly in view of their potential impact on the availability and prices of key raw materials, including sulphur. Any sustained increase in input costs and foreign exchange volatility could continue to exert pressure on margins.

Notwithstanding these challenges, the Company remains confident of its ability to navigate the evolving business environment through prudent planning, operational efficiency, cost optimisation, effective inventory management and a continued focus on strengthening its market presence.

The Company will continue to leverage opportunities across its diversified business segments while maintaining a disciplined approach towards costs and capital deployment. With continued support from the Government, improving operational efficiencies and strategic initiatives undertaken by the management, the Company remains committed to achieving sustainable growth and improving upon its financial performance in the coming year.

3. DIVIDEND :

The Board of Directors are pleased to recommend the dividend of Rs. 0.05 per share (5%) for the year 2025-26 on equity share capital, subject to the approval of the shareholders at the Annual General Meeting (Previous Year 5%) which shall absorb Rs. 45.31 lakhs (Previous Year Rs. 45.31 lakhs).

4. CAPITAL EXPENDITURE INCURRED :

The Company had incurred Rs. 675.50 lakhs as the capital expenditure during the year under review (Previous Year Rs.375.16 lakhs).

5. DIRECTORS/ KEY MANAGERIAL PERSONNEL (KMP) DETAILS:

Pursuant to the provisions of sub section (6) of section 152 the Companies Act, 2013 Shri. Rameshwar Kabra is liable to retire by rotation at the ensuing Annual General Meeting and being eligible, offers himself for re-appointment. The brief resume of Shri. Rameshwar Kabra has been provided in the corporate Governance Report forming part of this report. There have not been any changes in the Directors and KMP during the year.

During the financial year 2025–26, the Company continued to place strong emphasis on energy conservation and efficient utilization of energy resources across all its manufacturing units. Consistent efforts were made to reduce specific energy consumption through improved process controls, technological interventions, operational efficiencies and greater awareness among employees.

Specific as well as total energy consumption continues to be monitored on a daily basis at the individual factory/block level and at the consolidated manufacturing level. This systematic monitoring enables the Company to identify areas of improvement, strengthen operational controls and implement appropriate measures for optimizing energy consumption.

Energy conservation initiatives were reviewed and further strengthened across the manufacturing locations during the year. The key measures undertaken and continued during the year are as follows:

1. SSP Automation:

Automation of SSP operations has been continued across all manufacturing units, resulting in improved process control, operational efficiency and optimized energy consumption.

2. Use of Biomass Coal:

The use of biomass coal as an alternative fuel has been continued in the GSSP plants across the units. This initiative has helped reduce dependence on conventional energy sources and supports the Company's efforts towards more sustainable manufacturing practices.

3. Process Optimization:

Continuous improvements in the production process have been undertaken by optimizing production rates through modifications in vibrating screens and improvements in chain mill crushing. These measures have helped reduce the recycle load in the granulation process, thereby contributing to savings in both fuel and electrical power consumption.

4. Installation and Optimization of VFDs:

Variable Frequency Drives (VFDs) have continued to be utilized across various equipment in SSP and GSSP plants. Their use enables better control of equipment operation and contributes to efficient utilization of electrical energy.

5. Energy-Efficient Lighting:

The replacement of conventional HPSV lighting systems with energy-efficient LED lighting has been continued across factory premises. This initiative has contributed to reducing electricity consumption while improving lighting efficiency and reliability.

6. Employee Awareness and Participation:

The Company continued to promote awareness among employees regarding energy conservation and responsible use of energy. Employees across manufacturing units are encouraged to adopt energy-efficient operating practices and contribute towards reducing avoidable energy consumption.

7. Utilization of Renewable Energy:

Power generated from the Company's own windmills continues to be utilized for captive consumption. This initiative supports the Company's commitment to increasing the use of renewable energy and reducing its dependence on conventional sources of power.

8. Energy Audits:

Periodic energy audits are conducted at manufacturing units to assess energy utilization, identify potential areas for improvement and ensure optimum consumption of fuel and electricity. The recommendations arising from such audits are evaluated and implemented wherever feasible.

As explained to us, this deviation occurred due to the following reasons:

- **The Company's SDD software became inaccessible due to a technical error.**
- **The Company was required to re-install the SDD software.**
- **The backup data was lost, resulting in data recollection challenges.**
- **Consequently, the Company had to reconstruct and re-enter all past data, which was done on 16th April, 2025.**

Due to the above, the Company was unable to maintain the SDD on a contemporaneous (real-time) basis, as required under Regulation 3(5).

However, for the period under review, the Company is not fully compliant with the requirement of maintaining SDD on a real-time basis.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT**Organization Profile**

The Company has continued to strengthen its position as a prominent player in the agriculture sector, with a growing presence across key segments of the agricultural inputs and allied industries. Over the years, the Company has built a diversified product portfolio comprising Single Super Phosphate (SSP) fertilizers, hybrid seeds, and NPK mixture granulated fertilizers, catering to the changing requirements of farmers and supporting improved agricultural productivity.

Building on its core agricultural expertise, the Company has expanded its business interests into warehousing, cold storage, and LABSA manufacturing, creating additional avenues for growth and strengthening its presence across complementary industries. The Company has also enhanced its capabilities in the irrigation segment through its pipe manufacturing facility, offering products such as drip irrigation systems, sprinklers, and HDPE portable water pipes, thereby contributing to the adoption of efficient and modern water-management practices in agriculture.

The Company's flagship brand, "Krishi Sanjivani," continues to enjoy strong recognition and trust among the farming community, supported by a focus on product quality, reliability, and customer needs. With manufacturing and operational facilities strategically located across Maharashtra, Karnataka, and Madhya Pradesh, the Company is well positioned to serve diverse agricultural markets while maintaining operational and logistical efficiencies.

During FY 2025–26, the Company remained focused on strengthening its core businesses, broadening its product and market reach, improving operational capabilities, and creating sustainable long-term value for its stakeholders. As part of its commitment to responsible growth, the Company also continues to participate in the renewable energy sector through wind power generation, supporting its broader objective of integrating sustainability into its business operations.

With a diversified business model, established market presence, trusted brand equity, and a growing portfolio across agriculture and allied sectors, the Company remains well placed to capitalize on emerging opportunities and contribute meaningfully to the evolving needs of the agricultural ecosystem.

Indian Economy – Overview and Outlook for FY 2025–26

The Indian economy demonstrated strong resilience and sustained momentum during FY 2025–26, despite a challenging global environment marked by geopolitical tensions, trade disruptions, commodity-price volatility and evolving global supply-chain dynamics. India continued to remain among the fastest-growing major economies, supported by robust domestic demand, improving investment activity, resilient services, strengthening manufacturing and favourable macroeconomic fundamentals.

According to the latest estimates under the revised national accounts framework, with 2022–23 as the base year, India's real GDP is estimated to have grown by 7.6% in FY 2025–26, compared with 7.1% in FY 2024–25. Real GVA growth is estimated at 7.7%, reflecting broad-based expansion across key sectors of the economy. Manufacturing emerged as an important contributor to growth, while the services sector continued to provide stability and remain a major driver of economic activity. Both private final consumption expenditure and gross fixed capital formation recorded growth of more than 7%, highlighting the strength of domestic consumption and investment demand.

Domestic Growth Drivers

India's growth during FY 2025–26 was supported by a combination of resilient domestic consumption, higher investment activity, public infrastructure expenditure and improving manufacturing performance. Government-led capital expenditure continued to play an important role in strengthening infrastructure and productive capacity. The Union Budget for FY 2025–26 provided for capital expenditure of approximately ₹11.21 lakh crore, equivalent to around 3.1% of GDP, while maintaining the government's commitment towards fiscal consolidation. The fiscal deficit was budgeted at 4.4% of GDP.

Private investment also showed signs of strengthening, supported by healthier corporate balance sheets, improved capacity utilisation and greater business confidence. The combination of public investment and emerging private-sector investment is expected to remain an important foundation for India's medium-term growth trajectory.

Agriculture and Rural Economy

Agriculture and the rural economy continued to play a significant role in supporting broad-based economic activity. Favourable agricultural conditions, improving rural demand and expectations of stable food production provided support to rural consumption during the year. The Economic Survey 2025–26 has highlighted the importance of raising agricultural productivity, strengthening farm incomes, improving supply chains and enhancing resilience against climate-related risks.

For the agricultural inputs industry, continued emphasis on productivity enhancement, irrigation efficiency, balanced fertilisation, quality seeds, mechanisation and efficient water management provides significant long-term opportunities. Government initiatives aimed at improving agricultural infrastructure, strengthening rural connectivity and supporting farmers are also expected to contribute to the gradual transformation of India's agricultural ecosystem.

Inflation and Monetary Environment

Inflationary pressures moderated considerably during FY 2025–26, supported by favourable food-supply conditions and easing price pressures. The Economic Survey noted that inflation remained well anchored, with the Reserve Bank of India revising its FY 2025–26 headline inflation projection to around 2.0% in December 2025, reflecting favourable food-price developments.

The moderation in inflation provided greater flexibility for monetary policy and supported household purchasing power and domestic consumption. Nevertheless, food-price volatility, weather-related disruptions and movements in global commodity prices remain important factors that could influence the inflation outlook.

Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Formalisation

Manufacturing continued to strengthen its contribution to India's economic growth during FY 2025–26. The revised national accounts estimates indicate that manufacturing recorded strong growth and remained a key driver of the country's overall economic performance. The continued expansion of infrastructure, logistics, industrial capacity and digital systems is supporting India's transition towards a more competitive and integrated production ecosystem.

The increasing formalisation of economic activity, supported by GST, digital payments, improved tax compliance and greater integration of formal financial systems, continues to strengthen the underlying structure of the Indian economy. These developments are improving transparency, widening the formal economic base and supporting more efficient allocation of capital and resources.

Technology, Artificial Intelligence and Digital Transformation

Technology and digital transformation continued to emerge as important structural drivers of India's economic development. The rapid adoption of Artificial Intelligence (AI), automation, digital public infrastructure and data-driven technologies is creating opportunities for productivity enhancement across manufacturing, agriculture, financial services, logistics and other sectors.

The Economic Survey 2025–26 has specifically identified the evolution of India's AI ecosystem as an important area for future growth. India's expanding digital infrastructure, large domestic market, growing technology capabilities and entrepreneurial ecosystem provide a strong foundation for the adoption of emerging technologies.

Global Environment and Geopolitical Developments

The global economic environment remained uncertain during FY 2025–26. Geopolitical conflicts, trade restrictions, supply-chain disruptions and volatility in energy and commodity markets continued to pose risks to global growth and inflation.

At the same time, these developments have reinforced the strategic importance of supply-chain diversification, domestic manufacturing capabilities and resilient logistics networks. India's large domestic market, expanding manufacturing base, growing services exports and improving infrastructure position the country to benefit from the ongoing restructuring of global supply chains.

India's continued efforts towards deeper trade integration, stronger economic partnerships and improved logistics connectivity are expected to enhance its role in global trade and investment flows.

Sustainability and Green Growth

Sustainability and the transition towards cleaner sources of energy remained important elements of India's long-term development strategy. The expansion of renewable energy, energy efficiency, green mobility, green hydrogen and other clean technologies is creating new opportunities across industries.

India's focus on renewable energy capacity, energy security and lower-carbon economic growth is expected to encourage continued investment in clean-energy infrastructure. The transition towards a more sustainable economy also creates opportunities for businesses to adopt energy-efficient processes, renewable power and environmentally responsible operating practices.

Outlook

Looking ahead, India's economic outlook remains fundamentally positive, supported by several structural strengths:

- Strong domestic consumption and a large internal market;
- Continued public investment in infrastructure and productive assets;
- Improving private-sector investment and manufacturing capabilities;
- Rising formalisation and digitalisation of economic activity;
- Strengthening rural demand and agricultural productivity;

- Expansion of technology, AI and digital infrastructure;
- Increasing integration with global supply chains; and
- Continued focus on renewable energy and sustainable development.

The economic outlook, however, remains subject to external and domestic risks. These include geopolitical tensions, global trade fragmentation, fluctuations in crude oil and other commodity prices, adverse weather conditions, currency movements and potential disruptions to international supply chains. The Economic Survey has also highlighted the importance of structural reforms, productivity enhancement, competitiveness and continued investment to sustain India's medium-term growth potential.

Overall, FY 2025–26 demonstrated the underlying strength and resilience of the Indian economy. With real GDP growth estimated at **7.6%**, improving investment conditions, moderated inflation and continued structural transformation, India remains well positioned to sustain its growth trajectory. The combination of domestic demand, infrastructure development, manufacturing expansion, agricultural transformation, technological advancement and the green-energy transition is expected to provide a broad and diversified foundation for India's economic growth in the years ahead.

Indian Agriculture – Outlook and Developments for FY 2025–26

Indian agriculture continued to remain a cornerstone of the country's economic and social framework during FY 2025–26, supporting rural livelihoods, food security and broad-based economic development. The sector demonstrated considerable resilience during the year, supported by favourable agricultural conditions, continued policy support, improving farm productivity and increasing adoption of technology and modern agricultural practices.

FY 2025–26 witnessed a significant improvement in agricultural production. According to the latest Third Advance Estimates released by the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare, India's total foodgrain production is estimated at a record 376.56 million tonnes, an increase of approximately 18.8 million tonnes, or 5.3%, over the previous year's production of 357.73 million tonnes. The increase reflects improved crop performance, favourable growing conditions, better availability of agricultural inputs and continued institutional support to farmers.

The year also witnessed strong performance across several major crops. Rice production is estimated at around 154.02 million tonnes, wheat production at 120.66 million tonnes, and maize production at 55.09 million tonnes, with each reaching significant production milestones. Oilseed production is also estimated at a record level, supported by higher production of groundnut and rapeseed-mustard.

Strengthening Rural and Agricultural Foundations

The agricultural sector continued to benefit from government initiatives aimed at improving farm productivity, strengthening farmer incomes and enhancing agricultural infrastructure. Policy emphasis remained focused on improving access to quality seeds and fertilisers, expanding irrigation, strengthening agricultural supply chains, promoting mechanisation and encouraging technology-enabled farming.

The Economic Survey 2025–26 highlights the increasing importance of higher-value agricultural activities, including horticulture, livestock and fisheries, alongside traditional crop production. At the same time, improving productivity remains critical given challenges such as fragmented landholdings, uneven irrigation coverage, limited mechanisation and variations in soil health across regions.

Government support through farmer welfare programmes, crop insurance, minimum support prices, agricultural infrastructure initiatives and digital agricultural platforms continued to provide an important foundation for rural economic activity. The Government also increased MSPs for mandated Kharif crops for Marketing Season 2025–26, supporting farmer remuneration and providing greater income visibility.

Irrigation, Technology and Sustainable Agriculture

Water efficiency and climate resilience continued to gain importance in Indian agriculture. Increasing adoption of micro-irrigation systems, including drip irrigation and sprinklers, is supporting more efficient utilisation of water resources and helping farmers improve productivity.

Technology is also playing an increasingly important role in agriculture through digital advisory platforms, remote sensing, precision farming, drones, fertigation and improved access to market and weather information. These developments are gradually transforming conventional farming practices and creating opportunities for more efficient and sustainable input utilisation.

The Economic Survey has also emphasised the need for balanced and judicious use of fertilisers, particularly in view of soil degradation and deficiencies in organic carbon, macronutrients and micronutrients such as sulphur. Greater emphasis on nutrient-use efficiency and integrated nutrient management is therefore expected to remain an important feature of Indian agriculture.

Outlook for Indian Agriculture

The outlook for Indian agriculture remains positive, supported by:

- Record foodgrain production and improving crop productivity;
- Continued government support for farmers and agricultural infrastructure;
- Increasing adoption of irrigation, mechanisation and digital technologies;
- Growing emphasis on soil health and balanced nutrient management;
- Expansion of higher-value segments such as horticulture, livestock and fisheries;
- Strengthening rural consumption and agricultural supply chains; and
- Greater focus on climate-resilient and resource-efficient farming.

At the same time, agriculture remains exposed to risks arising from climate variability, uneven rainfall, water availability, input costs, commodity-price movements and changing global trade conditions. Continued investment in irrigation, technology, storage, logistics, soil health and resilient farming systems will therefore remain essential for sustaining long-term agricultural growth.

Overall, FY 2025–26 reinforced the resilience and growth potential of Indian agriculture. The combination of record production, policy support, technological advancement and increasing focus on resource efficiency provides a favourable foundation for the sector's continued contribution to India's economic development.

Indian Fertilizer Industry – Outlook and Trends for FY 2025–26

The Indian fertilizer industry continued to play a critical role in supporting agricultural productivity and food security during FY 2025–26. Rising agricultural output, strong sowing activity and the continued focus on balanced nutrient application supported steady demand for major fertiliser categories.

During FY 2025–26, the total assessed requirement of major fertilisers stood at approximately 677.18 lakh metric tonnes (LMT), compared with 649.43 LMT in FY 2024–25, representing an increase of around 4%. Fertilizer availability remained adequate throughout the year, supported by domestic production, imports, advance planning and improved supply-chain management.

The Government continued to closely monitor the availability of Urea, DAP, MOP and NPKS to ensure uninterrupted supply during peak agricultural seasons. At the end of the Rabi 2025–26 season, availability exceeded assessed requirements across the major fertilizer categories, including Urea, DAP, MOP, NPK and SSP. SSP availability stood at 50.10 LMT against a requirement of 31.19 LMT, demonstrating a comfortable supply position.

Growing Importance of Balanced Fertilisation

The Indian fertilizer sector is increasingly moving towards more balanced and efficient nutrient management. Excessive or imbalanced application of individual nutrients can adversely affect soil health, nutrient-use efficiency and long-term agricultural productivity. Consequently, greater attention is being placed on the appropriate combination of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, sulphur and micronutrients based on crop and soil requirements.

This trend is particularly relevant for Single Super Phosphate (SSP), which provides phosphorus and sulphur along with calcium and other secondary nutrients. SSP therefore remains an important fertiliser for crops and regions where phosphorus and sulphur deficiencies are prevalent.

The Economic Survey 2025–26 has highlighted the importance of restoring nutrient balance through greater use of phosphorus, potassium and organic matter, while improving soil health and nutrient-use efficiency. This creates a favourable long-term environment for balanced fertilisers and products capable of addressing specific soil and crop nutrient requirements.

SSP and Domestic Fertilizer Manufacturing

SSP continued to maintain an important position within India's phosphatic fertilizer ecosystem during FY 2025–26. Domestic production and availability remained substantial, while government measures to strengthen domestic fertilizer production and maintain adequate stocks helped reduce the risk of supply disruptions.

Domestic SSP production during the opening quarter of FY 2026–27 reached **13.50 LMT between April and June 2026**, demonstrating the continued scale of the domestic SSP manufacturing base.

The Government also continued to strengthen fertilizer supply security through long-term import arrangements for DAP and other phosphatic fertilizers. These measures are aimed at managing India's dependence on imported fertilizer and raw materials while ensuring timely availability to farmers.

Key Industry Trends

The fertilizer industry is expected to remain influenced by the following structural trends:

- Continued growth in agricultural production and cultivated acreage;
- Increasing focus on balanced fertilisation and soil health;
- Rising awareness of sulphur and micronutrient deficiencies;
- Greater adoption of crop- and soil-specific nutrient application;
- Increasing use of fertigation and precision agriculture;
- Continued government support through fertilizer subsidy mechanisms;
- Strengthening of domestic fertilizer manufacturing capabilities;
- Greater emphasis on supply-chain resilience and fertilizer availability; and
- Growing integration of organic and alternative nutrient sources with conventional fertilisers.

Outlook

The outlook for the Indian fertilizer industry remains constructive. India's expanding agricultural output, growing food requirements and continuing focus on improving farm productivity are expected to provide a stable foundation for fertilizer demand.

At the same time, the industry will continue to navigate challenges associated with international fertilizer prices, raw-material availability, import dependence for certain nutrients, subsidy policies, energy costs and global geopolitical developments.

For SSP manufacturers, the increasing emphasis on **balanced fertilisation, sulphur nutrition, soil health and efficient nutrient application** presents meaningful long-term opportunities. As farmers increasingly adopt crop-specific and soil-specific nutrient management practices, products that provide multiple essential nutrients in an efficient and economical manner are expected to remain relevant.

Overall, FY 2025–26 demonstrated the importance of a reliable and diversified fertilizer ecosystem in supporting India's record agricultural performance. With strong agricultural fundamentals, continued policy support and increasing awareness of balanced nutrient management, the Indian fertilizer industry is well positioned to support the next phase of growth in Indian agriculture.

Current and Future Outlook – FY 2025–26

The financial year 2025–26 was a challenging year for the Company, marked by geopolitical uncertainties, volatility in raw material prices—particularly sulphur—and fluctuations in foreign exchange rates. Despite these external challenges, the Company remained focused on strengthening operational efficiency, optimizing costs, improving inventory management, and expanding its market presence.

Against this backdrop, the Company achieved a significant milestone by recording a turnover of ₹587.34 crore, as compared with ₹469.69 crore in the previous financial year.

The Fertiliser Division recorded its highest-ever turnover of ₹331.44 crore, compared with ₹269.24 crore in the previous year, reflecting sustained demand and continued focus on the Company's core business.

The Seed Division remained resilient and maintained its turnover at ₹142.50 crore, as compared with ₹146.90 crore in the previous year.

The Company's LABSA division continued its strong growth trajectory and contributed ₹88.72 crore to the overall turnover, compared with ₹38.97 crore in the previous year, representing more than a two-fold increase in turnover.

The Company's other business divisions, including Warehousing, Cold Storage and Pipes, also recorded a significant improvement in their contribution to the overall turnover. The aggregate turnover from these divisions increased from ₹14.58 crore to ₹24.68 crore, demonstrating the Company's continued efforts to diversify its business operations and strengthen its revenue base.

Fertiliser Business and Government Support

During the year under review, international fertiliser prices remained volatile, primarily due to geopolitical developments and fluctuations in input costs. In response to these developments, the Government of India increased the Nutrient Based Subsidy (NBS) for phosphatic fertilisers to ₹7,263 per MT for the period from April 2025 to September 2025, as against ₹5,121 per MT previously. Subsequently, the NBS rate was further increased to ₹7,408 per MT for the period from October 2025 to March 2026.

The increase in NBS provided support to the Company's fertiliser operations and helped partially offset the impact of higher production costs arising from increased raw material prices. Despite the challenging operating environment, the Company was able to maintain profitability, albeit at a modest level.

Outlook for FY 2026–27

The outlook for the financial year 2026–27 remains cautiously optimistic. Preliminary indicators point towards a broadly normal monsoon during the initial part of the season, although some variability and a possible shortfall are expected after July 2026. The monsoon remains a key factor influencing agricultural activity, fertiliser consumption and overall demand in the Company's key markets.

The Government of India has further increased the NBS rate for phosphatic fertilisers to ₹8,149 per MT, compared with ₹7,408 per MT applicable during the second half of FY 2025–26. The continued policy support for the fertiliser sector, including indications regarding freight subsidy support for phosphatic fertilisers, is expected to provide further stability to the industry.

At the same time, the continuing geopolitical tensions and the ongoing conflict in the Middle East remain areas of concern, particularly in view of their potential impact on the availability and prices of key raw materials, including sulphur. Any sustained increase in input costs and foreign exchange volatility could continue to exert pressure on margins.

Notwithstanding these challenges, the Company remains confident of its ability to navigate the evolving business environment through prudent planning, operational efficiency, cost optimisation, effective inventory management and a continued focus on strengthening its market presence.

The Company will continue to leverage opportunities across its diversified business segments while maintaining a disciplined approach towards costs and capital deployment. With continued support from the Government, improving operational efficiencies and strategic initiatives undertaken by the management, the Company remains committed to achieving sustainable growth and improving upon its financial performance in the coming year.

Strategic Direction

The Company remains focused on strengthening its core agricultural businesses while accelerating growth across its diversified portfolio of allied businesses. The favourable performance of Indian agriculture during FY 2025–26, record foodgrain production, continued fertilizer demand and increasing emphasis on balanced nutrient management provide a supportive operating environment for the Company's core businesses.

Going forward, the Company's strategic priorities will include:

- **Strengthening the SSP and seed business** by expanding market penetration, enhancing dealer and distribution networks and increasing the Company's presence across key agricultural markets.
- **Capitalising on the growing emphasis on balanced fertilisation and soil health**, with greater awareness among farmers regarding phosphorus, sulphur and other essential nutrients.
- **Scaling the LABSA, Pipes and Warehousing businesses** to further diversify the Company's revenue base and create additional avenues for sustainable growth.
- **Expanding irrigation-related product offerings**, including drip irrigation systems, sprinklers and HDPE pipes, in line with the increasing focus on efficient water management and modern agricultural practices.
- **Improving operational efficiency and cost competitiveness** through better capacity utilisation, procurement optimisation, supply-chain management and process improvements.
- **Leveraging technology and data-driven decision-making** across manufacturing, distribution and business operations to enhance productivity and customer reach.
- **Maintaining a disciplined approach to working capital and capital allocation**, while pursuing growth opportunities that generate sustainable returns.
- **Integrating sustainability into business operations**, including greater focus on resource efficiency and renewable energy.

The Company believes that its diversified business model, established market presence, strategic manufacturing locations and trusted “**Krishi Sanjivani**” brand provide a strong platform to capture emerging opportunities across agriculture and allied sectors.

Opportunities and Threats – FY 2025–26

Opportunities

The Indian agriculture sector demonstrated strong resilience during FY 2025–26. The country's total foodgrain production is estimated at a record **376.56 million tonnes**, approximately 5.3% higher than the previous year. Strong agricultural output,

continued government support and improving farm productivity created a favourable environment for the agricultural inputs industry. (pib.gov.in)

Fertilizer demand also remained robust during the year. The assessed requirement of major fertilizers increased to approximately **677.18 LMT in FY 2025–26**, compared with 649.43 LMT in FY 2024–25. Fertilizer availability remained adequate across major categories, supporting timely application during the Kharif and Rabi seasons. (pib.gov.in)

Against this backdrop, the Company sees several opportunities for sustainable growth:

1. Growth in Agricultural Input Demand

The improvement in agricultural production, rising farm productivity and continued focus on food security are expected to support long-term demand for fertilizers, seeds and other agricultural inputs. The Company's presence across multiple agricultural-input categories provides an opportunity to participate in this structural growth.

2. Increasing Demand for SSP and Balanced Fertilisation

The growing emphasis on **soil health, balanced nutrient application and sulphur management** provides a favourable environment for SSP. The Economic Survey 2025–26 has highlighted concerns around nutrient imbalance and the need for more efficient use of fertilisers. This creates an opportunity for SSP to play a greater role in crop- and soil-specific nutrient management. (indiabudget.gov.in)

3. Expansion of Irrigation and Water-Efficient Agriculture

Increasing focus on water conservation and efficient irrigation is expected to support demand for **drip irrigation, sprinklers and HDPE pipes**. The Company's presence in this segment provides an opportunity to benefit from the gradual shift towards precision and resource-efficient agriculture.

4. Diversification into Allied Businesses

The Company's businesses in **LABSA, Pipes, Warehousing and Cold Storage** provide additional growth opportunities beyond the traditional fertilizer business. These businesses can help diversify revenue streams, improve asset utilisation and reduce dependence on a single agricultural cycle.

5. Strategic Manufacturing Locations

The Company's manufacturing facilities across **Maharashtra, Karnataka and Madhya Pradesh** provide proximity to important agricultural markets and consumption centres. This geographic footprint can support efficient distribution, shorter delivery timelines and better customer service.

6. Technology and Modern Agriculture

The increasing adoption of digital agriculture, precision farming, mechanisation, fertigation and technology-enabled farm advisory services is creating opportunities for agricultural-input companies to improve farmer engagement and product penetration.

7. Government Support and Domestic Manufacturing

The Government continues to focus on fertilizer availability, domestic manufacturing capabilities, agricultural infrastructure and reducing vulnerabilities arising from excessive dependence on global supply chains. These initiatives provide a supportive long-term environment for domestic fertilizer manufacturers. (pib.gov.in)

Key Threats and Industry Challenges

Despite favourable structural opportunities, the Company's businesses remain exposed to several risks and uncertainties:

1. Policy and Regulatory Changes

The fertilizer industry is significantly influenced by government policies relating to **subsidies, nutrient-based subsidy rates, pricing mechanisms, freight support and import policies**. Changes in regulatory frameworks or subsidy structures may affect product pricing, demand and profitability.

2. Raw Material Price Volatility

The cost and availability of key raw materials, including **rock phosphate, sulphur, sulphuric acid and other inputs**, are influenced by international commodity markets, freight costs, currency movements and geopolitical developments. Significant increases in input costs can exert pressure on operating margins and working capital.

3. Monsoon and Climate Risks

Despite the strong agricultural performance during FY 2025–26, Indian agriculture continues to remain exposed to variations in rainfall, extreme weather events, droughts, floods, heatwaves and other climate-related disruptions. Any adverse weather conditions can affect crop sowing, agricultural productivity and demand for farm inputs.

4. Global Geopolitical and Supply-Chain Risks

Geopolitical tensions, trade restrictions, shipping disruptions and changes in international commodity markets may affect the availability and cost of imported raw materials and fertilizers. These factors can create uncertainty in procurement planning and inventory management.

5. Seasonal Nature of Fertilizer Demand

Fertilizer consumption remains concentrated around the **Kharif and Rabi cropping seasons**. This creates fluctuations in sales volumes, capacity utilisation, inventory requirements and working-capital needs during different periods of the year.

6. Competition and Pricing Pressure

The agricultural-input market remains competitive, with several established domestic and international players operating across fertilizers, seeds and irrigation products. Competitive pricing, dealer incentives, product availability and brand recognition can influence market share and margins.

7. Farmer Awareness and Product Adoption

Although awareness of balanced fertilization is increasing, adoption of specific nutrient products such as SSP varies across regions. Continued farmer education, demonstrations, dealer engagement and awareness-building initiatives are therefore important for expanding market penetration.

8. Working Capital and Subsidy Receivables

The fertilizer business requires efficient management of inventories, receivables and seasonal working-capital requirements. Any delay in subsidy-related receivables or changes in the timing of government payments may temporarily increase liquidity requirements.

9. Climate Change and Sustainability

Increasing climate variability and growing regulatory and stakeholder expectations relating to environmental sustainability may require businesses to invest in cleaner technologies, energy efficiency, resource conservation and environmentally responsible manufacturing processes.

Company's Approach to Risk and Opportunity

The Company seeks to address these challenges through **business diversification, geographic presence, prudent inventory management, cost optimisation, operational efficiency and disciplined working-capital management**. Its presence across fertilizers, seeds, irrigation products, LABSA, warehousing and renewable energy provides diversification and enables the Company to participate in multiple growth opportunities within and beyond the agricultural value chain.

With India's agricultural sector demonstrating strong production growth during FY 2025–26 and fertilizer demand remaining resilient, the Company believes that its diversified portfolio and established market presence provide a strong foundation for sustainable growth. At the same time, continued focus on operational efficiency, financial discipline, product quality and customer relationships will remain central to navigating industry uncertainties and creating long-term stakeholder value.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2026

1. Corporate Information

The Company is a leading player in the agriculture sector and is recognized as one of Maharashtra's foremost manufacturers of a diverse range of agricultural inputs. Our comprehensive product portfolio includes **SSP fertilizers**, **hybrid seeds**, and **NPK mixture granulated fertilizers**, all tailored to meet the evolving needs of the farming community.

In addition to our core focus on agriculture, we have strategically diversified into complementary sectors such as **warehousing**, **cold storage**, and **LABSA manufacturing**. We have further expanded our capabilities with a **state-of-the-art pipe manufacturing plant**, producing **drip irrigation systems**, **sprinklers**, and **HDPE portable water pipes**, supporting modern irrigation practices.

Our flagship brand, "**Krishi Sanjivani**," is widely trusted among farmers for its quality and performance. With production facilities spread across **Maharashtra, Karnataka, and Madhya Pradesh**, we ensure regional accessibility and operational efficiency.

Demonstrating our commitment to sustainability, the Company is also engaged in **renewable energy generation** through **wind turbines**, contributing to environmentally responsible growth.

• Summary of significant accounting policies

This note provides a list of the significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements. The policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

a) Basis of preparation

i. Compliance with Ind AS

Basis of preparation of financial statements Effective April 1, 2017 the company has adopted all the Ind AS standards and adoption was carried out in accordance with Ind AS 101, "First time adoption of Indian Accounting Standard", with April 1, 2016 as the transition date. The transition was carried out from the Indian Accounting Principles Generally Accepted in India as prescribed under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014(IGAAP), which was the previous GAAP. Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use. The financial statements are presented in INR and all values are rounded to the nearest INR Lakh, except when otherwise indicated.

ii. Current versus non-current classification

Classification of Assets and Liabilities as Current and Non-Current All Assets and Liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of product & activities of the Company and their realisation in cash and cash equivalent, the Company has determined its operating cycle as twelve months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities

b) Operating Segment

The company is primarily engaged in the business of manufacturers of various farm inputs in India comprising SSP Fertilizer, various hybrid seeds and NPK mixture granulated fertilizers. Most recently the Company has diversified into Warehousing, Cold Storage and LABSA manufacturing. Further all the commercial operations of the company are based in India. Performance is measured based on the management accounts as included in the internal management reports that are reviewed by the company's Chairman and Managing director. Accordingly, the Company classifies Seed, Fertilizer and Others as three major operating segments.

c) Fair value measurement

The Company measures financial instruments at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- Level 3 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

d) Revenue recognition

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised, when all the significant risk and rewards of ownership of the goods have passed to the buyer, the Company no longer has effective control over the goods sold, the amount of revenue and costs associated with the transaction can be measured reliably and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of consideration that will be derived from the sales of Goods. Revenue from the sale of goods is measured at the fair value of the consideration receivable, net of returns and allowances, trade discounts and volume rebates. The sales include the excise duty and exclude Value added tax/ sales tax/ Goods and service tax.

Rendering of services

Revenue received from Warehouse, i.e. Rental Income is recognised on accrual basis as and when the outcome of a transaction can be reliably estimated.

Interest income

Interest income for debt instruments is recognised using the effective interest rate method. The effective interest rate is the rate that discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset. When calculating the effective interest rate, the company estimates the expected cash flows by considering contractual terms of the financial instrument but does not consider the expected credit losses.

Dividends

Dividend is recognised when the Company's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

Subsidy

Subsidy is recognized on the quantity of fertilisers sold during the year to the distributors, wholesalers, etc. Final Subsidy is, however, realised upon final sales to the farmers from the POS (Point of Sale). Thus, the amount of subsidy income and receivable includes subsidy on unsold stock lying in point of sales (POS) calculated at the rates notified during the year under Nutrient Based Subsidy (NBS) policy. At the time of ultimate sale to the farmer, the amount of subsidy may be revised to the extent of notified rate applicable on the date of sales.

Government Subsidy

Subsidy is recognized as per Ind AS 20 'Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance' on the basis of the rates notified from time to time by the Government of India in accordance with the Nutrient Based Subsidy (NBS) policy on the quantity of fertilisers sold during the year by the Company for the period for which notification has been issued. Subsidy income has been recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with all necessary conditions attached to Subsidy including those under the Direct Benefit Transfer system which was introduced by the Government of India which includes satisfaction of conditions specified and compliance with reasonable margin guidelines, assessment of applicable rates for fertilizers sold, evaluation of recoverability of receivables

e) Segment reporting:

The Managing Directors monitor the operating results of the business Segments separately for the purpose of making decisions about resource allocation and performance assessment. Segment performance is evaluated based on profit or loss and is measured consistently with profit or loss in the financial statements.

The Operating segments have been identified on the basis of the nature of products. Segment revenue includes sales and other income directly identifiable with/ allocable to the Segment.

Expenses that are directly identifiable with / allocable to segments are considered for determining the segment result. Expenses which relate to the Company as a whole and not allocable to segments are included under unallocable expenditure. Income which relates to the Company as a whole and not allocable to segments is included in unallocable income.

Segment result represent the profit before interest and tax earned by each segment without allocation of central administrative costs. Segment assets and liabilities include those directly identifiable with the respective segments. Unallocable assets and liabilities represent the assets and liabilities that relate to the Company as a whole and not allocable to any segment.

The company has disclosed Business Segments as its primary segments. Reporting segments have been identified as Fertilizers, Micro Nutrients & Chemicals and Oil, taking into accounts the nature of product, the different risk and returns, the organizational structure and the internal reporting system.

The company caters mainly to the need of domestic market. The direct export turnover is Nil during the year. As such there are no reportable geographical segments.

f) Income Taxes

Income tax comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognized in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to an items recognized directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current income tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of the previous years. The amount of current tax reflects the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received after considering the uncertainty, if any, related to income taxes. It is measured using tax rates (and tax laws) enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset only if there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts, and it is intended to realise the asset and settle the liability on a net basis or simultaneously.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognized in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax is also recognized in respect of carried forward tax loss and tax credits.

Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which they can be used. The existence of unused tax losses is strong evidence that future taxable profit may not be available. Therefore in case of history of recent losses, the company recognizes a deferred tax asset only to the extent that it has sufficient taxable temporary differences or there is convincing other evidence that sufficient taxable profit will be available against which such deferred tax asset can be realized. Deferred tax asset –unrecognized or recognized, are reviewed at each reporting date and are recognized/ reduced to the extent that it is probable/ no longer probable respectively that the related tax benefit will be realized.

Deferred tax measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

The measurement of deferred tax reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the company expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they to income taxes levied by the same tax authority.

Current and deferred tax for the year

Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

g) Leases

The determination of whether an arrangement is (or contains) a lease is based on the substance of the arrangement at the inception of the lease. The arrangement is, or contains, a lease if fulfilment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets and the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset or assets, even if that right is not explicitly specified in an arrangement.

Finance Lease

Finance Lease is a lease that transfer substantially all of the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item, are capitalised at the commencement of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. Lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and a reduction in the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognised in finance costs in the statement of profit and loss unless they are directly attributable to qualifying assets, in which case they are capitalised in accordance with the Company's policy on borrowing costs. A leased asset is depreciated over the useful life of the asset. However, if there is no reasonable certainty that the Company will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term, the asset is depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term. Operating Lease

Assets acquired on leases where a significant portion of the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by lessor are classified as operating leases. Lease rentals paid for operating leases are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss with reference to lease term and other consideration.

h) Provisions and Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resource embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit and loss net of any reimbursement. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is

recognised as a finance cost Contingent Assets are not recognised in financial statements but are disclosed, since the for mer treatment may result in the recognition of income that may or may not be realised. However, when the realisation of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is not a contingent asset and its recognition is appropriate

i) Property, plant and equipment

- a. On transition to IND AS, the company has adopted optional exception under IND AS 101 to measured Property, plant and Equipment at carrying value, consequently the carrying value has been assumed to be deemed cost of property, plant and Equipment on the date of transition, subsequently property.
- b. Property, plant and equipment acquired after the transition date are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchased price, borrowing cost if capitalized criteria are met and directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition for the intended use. Any trade discounts, rebates & cenvat availed, are deducted in arriving at the purchase price.
- c. Capital work –in-progress comprises of the cost of fixed assets that are not yet ready for their intended use at the reporting date.
- d. Subsequent expenditures relating to property, plant and equipment is capitalized only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with these will flow to the Company and the costs to the item can be measured reliably. Repairs and maintenance costs are recognised in net profit in the statement of profit and loss when incurred. The cost and related accumulated depreciation are eliminated from the financial statements upon sale or retirement of the asset and the resultant gain or losses are recognised in the statement of profit and loss.
- e. Gains or losses arising from de-recognized of fixed assets are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the statement of profit and loss when the assets is derecognized.
- f. Machinery spares/ standby equipments which are used only in connection with property, plant and equipment and are of material value to the overall value of the asset are capitalized.

j) Depreciation

- i. Depreciation on tangible assets is provided on the straight – line method over the useful lives of assets as prescribed in schedule ii of the Companies Act, 2013, except in respect of following categories of assets in whose case the life of certain assets has been assessed based on technical advice taking into account the nature of the asset, the estimated usage of the asset, the operating condition of the asset, past history of replacement, maintenance support etc.
- ii. Depreciation for assets purchased / sold during a period are proportionately charged.
- iii. Intangible Assets are amortized on straight-line basis over the estimated useful economic life.

k) Inventories

Inventories are valued as under: -

- i. Raw material, Work in process and Packing Materials: -

At Cost on First in First out (FIFO) basis or net realizable value whichever is lower. Raw material and work in process are not written down below cost if the finished product in which they will incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost.

- ii. Finished Goods: -

At cost or net realizable value whichever is lower. The cost is computed on weighted average method and includes cost of materials, cost of conversion and other costs incurred in acquiring the inventory and bringing them to their present location and condition.

- iii. Stores & Spares: -

At Cost on FIFO Basis.

l) Reclassification to investment property

When the use of a property changes from owner-occupied to investment property, the property is reclassified as investment property at its carrying amount on the date of reclassification.

m) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits, (which are not pledged) with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

n) Employee Benefits**Provident Fund / ESIC**

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund / ESIC are a defined contribution scheme and the contributions are charged to the profit and loss of the year when the contributions to the respective fund are due. There are no other obligations other than the contribution payable to the respective funds.

Gratuity /Leave encashment

The obligation of assets recognised in the balance sheet in respect to defined benefit / leave encashment value of the defined benefit obligation at the end of the reporting period less the fair value of plan assets. The defined benefit obligation is calculated annually by actuaries using the projected unit credit method.

Change in the present value of the defined benefit obligation resulting from plan amendments or curtailments are recognised immediately in profit or loss as past service cost.

Re-measurement gain and losses arising from experience adjustment and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognised in the period in which they occur, directly in other comprehensive income. They are included in retain earning in the statement of changes in equity and in the balance sheet. Re-measurements are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods.

o) Foreign currencies

The Company's financial statements are presented in INR, which is also the Company's functional currency.

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded by the Company into functional currency at the exchange rate on the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency spot rates of exchange at the reporting date.

Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in profit or loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions.

p) Earnings Per Share

Basic Earnings per share (EPS) amounts are calculated by dividing the profit for the year attributable to equity holders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

q) Statement of Cash Flow

Cash Flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit for the year is adjusted for the effects of transition of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accrual of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and items of income or expense is associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated. The company considers all highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash to be cash equivalents.

r) Financial Assets

A Financial Instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. At initial recognition, all financial assets are measured at fair value. Such financial assets are subsequently classified under following three categories according to the purpose for which they are held. The classification is reviewed at the end of each reporting period.

- i. Financial Assets at Amortised Cost At the date of initial recognition, are held to collect contractual cash flows of principal and interest on principal amount outstanding on specified dates. These financial assets are intended to be held until maturity. Therefore, they are subsequently measured at amortised cost by applying the Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset. The EIR amortisation is included as interest income in the profit or loss. The losses arising from impairment are recognised in the profit or loss.
- ii. Financial Assets at Fair value through Other Comprehensive Income At the date of initial recognition, are held to collect contractual cash flows of principal and interest on principal amount outstanding on specified dates, as well as held for selling. Therefore, they are subsequently measured at each reporting date at fair value, with all fair value movements recognised in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). Interest income calculated using the effective interest rate (EIR) method, impairment gain or loss and foreign exchange gain or loss are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in Other Comprehensive Income is reclassified from the OCI to Statement of Profit and Loss.
- iii. Financial Assets at Fair value through Profit or Loss At the date of initial recognition, financial assets are held for trading, or which are measured neither at Amortised Cost nor at Fair Value through OCI. Therefore, they

are subsequently measured at each reporting date at fair value, with all fair value movements recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

s) Trade Receivables.

A Receivable is classified as a 'trade receivable' if it is in respect to the amount due from customers on account of goods sold or services rendered in the ordinary course of business. Trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. For some trade receivables the Company may obtain security in the form of guarantee, security deposit or letter of credit which can be called upon if the counterparty is in default under the terms of the agreement. Impairment is made on the expected credit losses, which are the present value of the cash shortfalls over the expected life of financial assets.

losses are recognised in a separate provision for impairment and the impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss within other expenses. Subsequent changes in assessment of impairment are recognised in provision for impairment and the change in impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss within other expenses

t) Investment in Equity Shares.

Investments in Equity Securities are initially measured at cost. Any subsequent fair value gain or loss is recognized through Profit or Loss if such investments in Equity Securities are held for trading purposes. The fair value gains or losses of all other Equity Securities are recognized in Other Comprehensive Income.

Derecognition.

Financial Asset is primarily derecognised when:

- i. The right to receive cash flows from asset has expired, or.
- ii. The Company has transferred its right to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a "pass-through" arrangement and either:
 - a) The Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or
 - b) The Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Company has transferred its right to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained. Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at

the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the Company could be required to repay.

u) Investments in Associates

Investments in equity shares of Associates are recorded at cost and reviewed for impairment at each reporting date

v) Financial Liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts, and derivative financial instruments.

Subsequent Measurement.

The measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification, as described below:

- i. Financial Liabilities at Fair Value through Profit or Loss. Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading. The Company has not designated any financial liabilities upon initial measurement recognition at fair value through profit or loss. Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are at each reporting date with all the changes recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

ii. Financial Liabilities measured at Amortised Cost.

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method ("EIR") except for those designated in an effective hedging relationship. The carrying value of borrowings that are designated as hedged items in fair value hedges that would otherwise be carried at amortised cost are adjusted to record changes in fair values attributable to the risks that are hedged in effective hedging relationship. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fee or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in finance costs in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

iii. Loans and Borrowings.

After initial recognition, interest-bearing borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption amount is recognised in profit or loss over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method. Fees paid on the establishment of loan facilities are recognised as transaction costs of the loan to the extent that it is probable that some or all of the facility will be drawn down. Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Company has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

iv. Trade and Other Payables.

A payable is classified as 'trade payable' if it is in respect of the amount due on account of goods purchased or services received in the normal course of business. These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months after the reporting period. They are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

De-recognition of Financial Liability

A Financial Liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. The difference between the carrying amount of a financial liability that has been extinguished or transferred to another party and the consideration paid, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss as other income or finance costs.

Offsetting of Financial Instruments

Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

w) Exemptions and exceptions availed

In preparing these Ind AS Financial Statements, the Group has availed certain exemptions and exceptions in accordance with Ind AS 101, as explained below. The resulting difference between the carrying values of the assets and liabilities in the Consolidated Financial Statements as at the transition date under Ind AS and IGAAP have been recognised directly in equity (retained earnings or another appropriate category of equity). This Note explains the adjustments made by the Group in restating its IGAAP Consolidated Financial Statements, including the Balance Sheet as at April 01, 2016 and the Consolidated Financial Statements as at and for the year ended March 31, 2017.

a) Ind AS optional exemptions

Set out below are the applicable Ind AS 101 optional exemptions and mandatory exceptions applied in the transition from previous IGAAP to Ind AS.

b) Ind AS mandatory exceptions

The Group has applied the following exceptions from full retrospective application of Ind AS mandatorily required under Ind AS 101:

x) Estimates

The Group made estimates for following items in accordance with Ind AS at the date of transition as these were not required under IGAAP:

1. Investment in equity instruments carried at FVOCI;
2. Impairment of financial assets based on expected credit loss model.

y) Financial Risk Management objectives and Policies
Financial risk factors

The Company's operational activities expose to various financial risks i.e. market risk, credit risk and risk of liquidity. The Company realizes that risks are inherent and integral aspect of any business. The primary focus is to foresee the unpredictability of financial markets and seek to minimize potential adverse effects on its financial performance. The primary market risk to the Company is foreign exchange risk & interest rate risk. The Company calculates and compares the alternative sources of funding by including cost of currency cover also. Whenever, the currency cover costs are such as to neutralize the advantage in foreign currency, loans are hedged so as to not to lose advantage. The Company uses derivative financial instruments to reduce foreign exchange risk exposures.

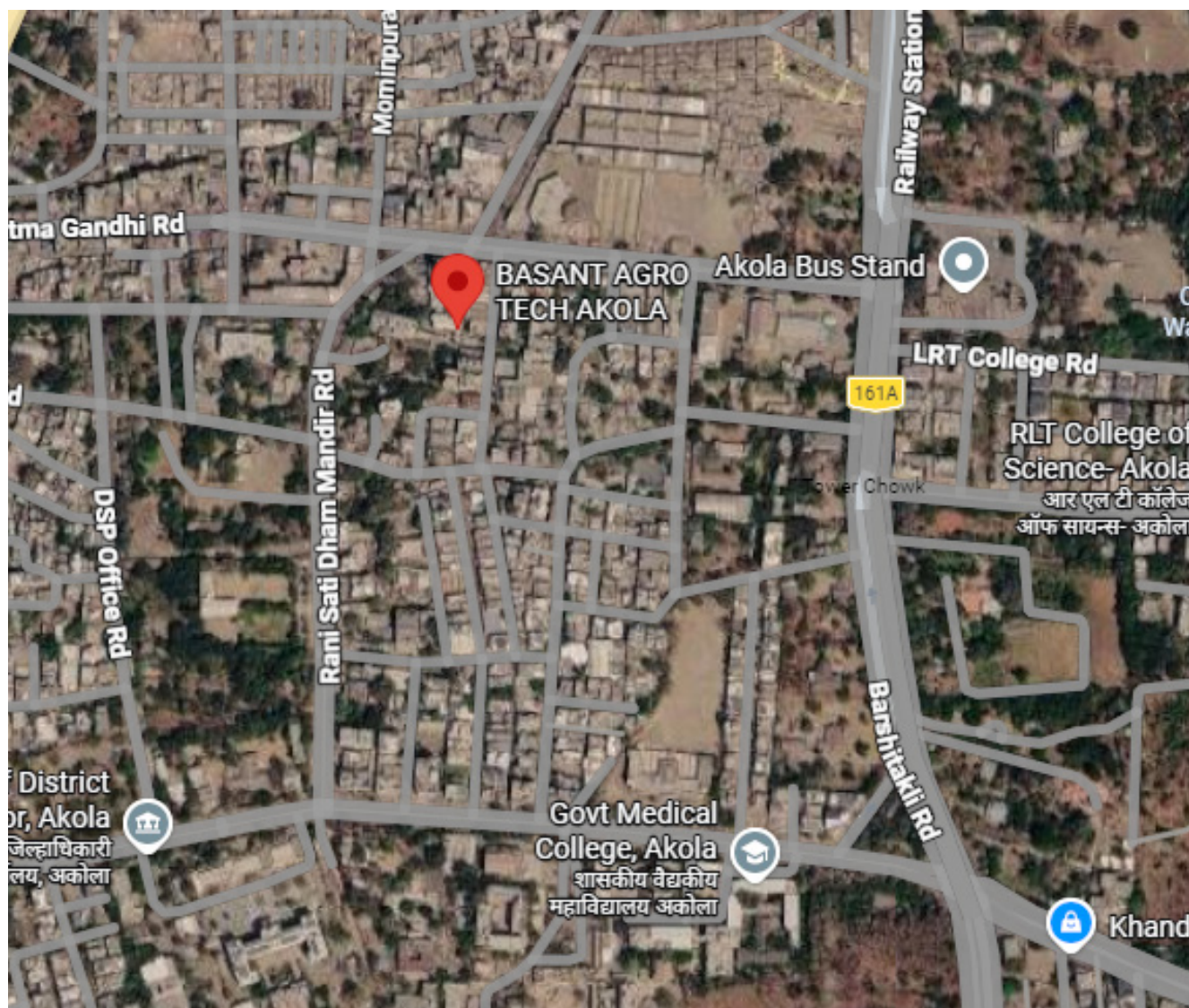
